

President's Message

For those who might not know, there is a substance called yamagoke, or mountain moss, which is essential for anyone who raises azaleas, camellias, or other acid-loving trees. The stuff comes in a compressed, dry bale the size of a brick, and it needs to be washed before it can be used. First you soak the brick overnight in a bucket of water, and then you stir it around before taking it, a handful at a time, squeezing the water out, and putting it in another bucket. You fill that bucket with water and do it all again, three times—rinse and repeat. An amazing amount of dirt comes out. It is a mind-numbingly boring task.

The upside to boring tasks, though, is they give us time to reflect and think. I believe that a lot of people in bonsai, especially the newer ones, suffer a great deal of apprehension and anxiety about their trees because they are afraid of making a mistake. Perhaps they fear or believe they will be embarrassed or shamed by doing so—clearly not the case at MBS, but a valid feeling, nonetheless.

My "day job" is in investments. Recently, a gentleman named Charlie Munger passed away. For something like sixty years he was Warren Buffett's business partner and close friend. Together, they are regarded as the most successful investors in the history of modern markets. Before he died, Charlie said something in an interview that really resonated with me. He said, "We learn nothing from success. All that a successful outcome does is confirm that you were correct in something you already knew. We learn by making mistakes, so that we establish what not to do—and if I make a few hundred more, I might start to know what I'm doing."

Lately I've been reading some of the teachings of His Holiness, the Dalai Lama. Last night I read one of his lessons in which he emphasizes the importance of having realistic expectations if we are to be truly happy. He explains the important distinction between our 'ideal'—where we want to get to—and the standards by which we measure our own progress on that journey. It may take us years, even decades, if our ideal is to be a bonsai 'expert', whatever that is, and it's unrealistic to expect it to happen quickly. We can, however, set our own individual goals and the standards by which we will feel that we have made progress. At the beginning, it may be progress to say I kept the tree alive for a whole year. Much later, it may be that I now feel I really understand ramification and refinement. The point is, each of us can have our own, unique ideal, and we alone choose the standards of our individual progress.

Along the way, I think it's important to pay attention to the small accomplishments and moments that make this hobby/art form/addiction so enriching. For myself, I think it's nothing short of a minor miracle that sitting in front of me is a white quince in full bloom, and that I get to experience this moment of beauty. I am genuinely grateful for that.

So....spring is well and truly under way, summer is around the corner. This is the time when bonsai is really fun, and the reason why we endure the boredom of dark Wisconsin winters, in order to get to this season. Get busy, risk making some mistakes, and enjoy the time. Most of all, remember that the reason you do this is because it makes you happy.



Nice weather ahead!

If you are beginning to bring out your trees, here's a recommendation as to where to place them:

- If deciduous trees are still in twig or just greening buds, put them in full sun
- If deciduous trees have foliage already, put them in full shade
- Conifers stored in dark places for the winter should go in full shade.
 - A garage window is still considered a dark place
- Conifers stored where they get direct outdoor light...even if it is in shade, can go in East sun for a week or 2 and then full sun
- Unless you are crazy like me and are bringing tropicals in and out...don't bring them out yet. I will bring some out and into full shade. Not even a bit of East sun.

Annual Exhibit Call for Trees and Education Opportunities

The MBS Education Committee has identified three categories of bonsai skills that all bonsai enthusiast should learn. Becoming proficient in these skills will give you the confidence to grow and maintain your trees.

Horticulture Skills - watering, fertilizing, seasonal care, repotting (Keeping my trees alive)

Styling Skills - Growing out trunks and branches, cutting back, pruning, building ramification, placing wire on a tree (Making the tree look good)

Presentation Skills - Pot selection, stand selection, accent piece selection and overall composition (pulling it all together and creating a great picture).

Each MBS member should reflect on the skill categories and self-determine at which level of proficiency their skills are at. The following describes these levels.

Open: You feel confident and reasonable proficient in performing these skills: Horticulture, Styling and Presentation.

Intermediate: You are becoming more confident/comfortable in performing these skills but you still are learning and refining these skills.

Novice: You are learning these skills and do not feel comfortable or proficient with all of these skills at this point in time.

CALL FOR TREES

We have had over a year of general meeting presentations to help level up our skills and enjoy doing it! We have had more than one meeting on the display aspect of presentation and preparation of your tree for show. We had a day long workshop last year to help set up your tree and selection process for exhibiting your tree. NOW is the time to up our presentation skills! This year's judge is Rick Garcia. Have him help you reach a new level. Exhibit participation includes:

- An assessment of your presentation so you can improve it for a future exhibit.
- An assessment of your tree that shows horticulture needs that you can address.
- An assessment of specific styling areas you can concentrate on improving over this next year.

By listening and taking the evaluation from our judge Rick Garcia you can build on next year's goal for the tree. Additionally, MBS Executive Committee with the Education Committee will use the evaluation to help you reach that next level. We will be planning great quality general meetings around areas that are identified as needing improvement. Your exhibit participation is critical to setting the tone for 2025 education.

New Talent Contest

Our MBS Executive Committee wants to discover and encourage our MBS new talent by holding the first annual New Talent Contest at the Annual Exhibit on Saturday, June 8th.

The requirements for entering the contest are:

- 1. Be an active MBS member.
- 2. Have less than 5 years' experience in the art of Bonsai.
- 3. Have attended at least one MBS class.
- 4. Not won a previous New Talent Competition
- 5. Not participated in a previous New Talent Competition.

The cost to enter the competition is \$30.

At the competition each contestant shall:

- 1. Be provided with similar raw material selected by the AE Committee
- 2. Furnish their own personal tools, wire and supplies at the competition.
- 3. Be given a 3-hour time period on Saturday afternoon starting at 1:00 PM on June 8th in which to style the randomly provided raw material into a bonsai.

The current three MBS teachers (Ron, Brian and Steve) will judge the completed bonsai and declare the winner. The winning new talent will be awarded the prize of a \$100 voucher to be used for a future MBS Class.




